Hello all, I want to take this chance to (re) introduce myself to you as the new Chair of One Nottingham.

I am delighted to have been invited to take on this new challenge and I am looking forward to working with the Board and our partners. This short column is to share thoughts with you on the successes and the challenges facing our partners - both the highlights and the lowlights.

As a kick off we should cele-

brate and congratulate the people who received the Nottingham Award this year (see later in this bulletin).

At the recent One Nottingham (ON) Board we considered the 5 year report of the Nottingham Plan, which reveals areas in which our city has performed well and those where we have not been so successful. There are some areas we can be pleased with - transport, resident satisfaction with neighbourhoods and in job creation. But there is much still to do, as there are too many families living below the poverty line in Nottingham.

In fact one of my early tasks will be to look at where ON can make its biggest impact and influence and we have already looked into the way that the partnership works and will look to build on this further.

The recent ON Board meeting

considered the challenges and the opportunities thrown up by the Devolution negotiations. The Board gave its support to Councillor Jon Collins in his deliberations with government. There are huge opportunities through devolved powers and fresh finance for the region. Nottingham's communities stand to benefit through job and wealth creation, by improvement in the regions transport infrastructure and through more local decision making about things which affect people's lives.

We will only achieve this through collaboration (in partnership). I want us to make things happen - to animate - and then to celebrate. By this we mean to innovate and to learn from our achievements (and our failures too), to recognise and to share our successes. We look forward to working with you all.

November One Nottingham Board Meeting

The Nottingham Plan, devolution and the future of the One Nottingham partnership were three key topics for discussion at the last Board meeting.

This was the first meeting chaired by Jane Todd, which was timely as the Nottingham Plan to 2020 five year (halfway) report was considered. The Board were able to consider the headline achievements, progress on commitments in the plan, have a look ahead, and to consider the priorities in the Nottingham Plan.

They made recommendations for the Council's Overview and Scrutiny panel. Poverty remains a stubborn challenge for the city and a priority for the Board. The report illustrated the growing economic gap between the South East and the rest of the country. One of the 'red' targets is caused by Nottingham slipping down the Government's Index of Multi-

ple Deprivation, mainly because London and South East councils are recovering fastest. We have maintained our position in comparison to the other English Core Cities.

Good news was reported in a significant number of targets: more than 2,300 jobs created; comparably high numbers of young people in education, employment and training; the Priority Families Initiative is ahead of its projected targets; and we can remain proud of the world class cultural and sporting offer of the city. We still need to do more in education and One Nottingham considered how the ON partnership can do better to inspire and encourage our communities and young people.

The Board received feedback on the One Nottingham review and consultation. The final findings and recommendations will be discussed at the January ON Board meeting. An insight from the report indi-

cates that, in the main, partners recognise that ON is doing a valuable job and should do more of it! The reasons partners give and the perception of the partnership varies from sector to sector, leaving the Board with a lot to consider. The Board members thanked everyone who has taken part in the interviews so far.

Devolution is a very hot topic in the government and partnership world. The Board discussed progress on negotiations and on the contents of the deal with Councillor Jon Collins. The Board viewed "devo" as a unique opportunity to raise the profile of Nottingham both regionally and nationally. The members are keen that the benefits are felt by Nottingham's communities. The deal must have the support of local people, be transparent and not add layers of bureaucracy.

The Nottingham Awards 2015

The Nottingham Awards, now in its fourth year acknowledges and celebrates the outstanding contributions that individuals have made to Nottingham. The Awards, sponsored by Geldards Law Firm, took place at the annual Goose Fair Dinner at the city's Council House.

The Public Sector award was presented to Ann Priest.

Anne received the award as she has made a major impact in Nottingham in Higher Education and in community arts, she has also been a significant influence across the UK and beyond.

Ann retired from Nottingham Trent University as the Pro-Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs and Head of the College of Art, Design and Built Environment in July 2015. Recently, she has been involved in establishing the Nottingham Media Academy, which brought together Nottingham Trent University, New College Nottingham, the Broadway Cinema and Media Centre and the Confetti Institute of Creative Technologies. She is a member of the Board of the Broadway Cinema and Media Academy and of the Nottingham Contemporary, to add to that she is also a Trustee of the Creative Quarter.

Ann has always been a passionate supporter of students, she

has worked with the Students Union as well as being an advocate for NTU's growing involvement in Nottingham's communities. It is no small part a credit to Ann's role that NTU now has a significant proportion of its students from the Greater Nottingham area.

She has been a regular advocate of the Nottingham Young Creative Awards since its beginning in 2009.

The Private / Business Sector award went to Ian Smith.

Ian Smith has been the Director of the Television Workshop since 1987 directing over 200 shows with the Workshop until his retirement this summer.

Under his direction, two plays for the National Theatre Connections project - *The Spider Men* (2006) and *He's Talking* (2008) - have been performed at the National Theatre on London's South Bank.

He has also written a number of performance pieces for the group - one of which was performed at the children's BAFTAs. The Television workshop won a BAFTA in its own right under Ian's direction. He has worked with Hat Trick Productions and has run casting/development workshops with Lucky Giant, the comedy arm of NBC Universal.

He works closely with Shane Meadows, many of whose films have substantial Workshop involvement and casts which include alumni of the Television Workshop. The cast of *'This is England'* still includes Television Workshop students.

As Workshop director, his work includes running weekly acting sessions, holding regular castings and acting as agent for his 300 strong group of young people.

The Voluntary / Community Sector award was presented to Inder Lal Batra.

Mr Batra has been a leading member of the Indian Community over the past 50 years in Nottingham. He has sought to promote understanding and co-operation between different communities and to help inform people of the different cultures in Nottingham.

He established the Hindu temple and the Punjabi Centre and committed his time to many other groups and organisations. Throughout the 1970s/80s and 90s he served as Chair of the African Caribbean and Asian Forum (ACAF), Nottingham & District Race Equality Council and the Indian Community Centre.

He helped to promote the cultural life of different groups through music and literature events, workshops and activities.

This year there were two special awards. The Sponsors Award nominated by Geldards and presented by Sir John Peace, and an award to recognise a life of service to Nottingham

The Geldards Sponsors Award was presented to Richard Tresidder.

Richard received his award for his long service in the city, his commitment to Nottingham and for his insightful and informed journalism in the Nottingham Post. He was business editor of the Nottingham Evening Post for many years and he continues to write for the Post. He is well known for his networking, his local knowledge and as a local raconteur.

Richard was a director of Profile Nottingham, the destination management company that grew into Experience Nottinghamshire. He is now a director of Bromley House, the subscription library in the Old Market Square and he has been an advocate for

Nottingham his whole life. He is a long term resident and advocate of the Lace Market.

A special award goes to Betty Higgins for her lifelong service to Nottingham.

Betty's long career in Nottingham went from being a school teacher, to Leader of Nottingham City Council for 10 years. Her achievements included the bus company, which laid the foundation for the trams and buses which we now have.

She presided over a growth in council housing and then maintained the council's housing stock to ensure that good quality housing would be available for local people and left the legacy for Nottingham City Homes.

The event was hosted by Mark Del of Nusic and the musical entertainment was provided by local blues singer songwriter - Ryan Farmer.

More than that, they have contributed across the city in a way which makes Nottingham a great place to be and they are an inspiration to the generations of people who follow".

Student Soniya's Painting Gets Pride of Place at Loxley House



A student from Bestwood is celebrating after her painting of some of Nottingham's best-known icons was chosen to hang at Nottingham City Council's Loxley House on Station Street. Designer Paul Smith and literary greats DH Lawrence, Lord Byron and Alan Sillitoe all feature in Soniya Ahmed's painting, as well as Albert Ball, the First World War flying ace.

Soniya, 18, is studying a BTEC Extended Diploma in Art & Design at Central College Nottingham. Her painting was com-

mended in the visual arts category of the Young Creative Awards earlier this year. That is when her impressive painting was spotted by the council. The theme of the awards was 'Made in Nottingham' and Soniya found plenty of inspiration while researching the great influencers of Nottingham, both past and present.

Soniya said: "I entered the awards as part of a college project and wanted to use some famous subjects, but also bring back to life those that maybe not everyone knows about. My previous college bought a piece of my artwork, but this is the first time that I've sold a piece of my artwork outside of college, so I'm really excited. It feels like I'm getting closer to my dream of becoming a famous artist!

Nigel Cooke, Director of One Nottingham who organise the Young Creative Awards, said: "We were impressed by the sheer scale of the painting, and the way Soniya brought the characters to life in such detail. I think it is a fitting addition to the Committee room at Loxley House as the subjects of the painting are some of the great influencers of Nottingham's rich history, and also as it's an investment in some of Nottingham's young talent."

Hockley Hustle Raises Money for Dolly

The Hockley Hustle raised over £15,000 for the Dolly Parton Imagination Library and other local charities.

Hockley came alive on Sunday 11 October as the Hockley Hustle music festival showcased, once again, the breadth of musical talent we have in Nottingham. This year saw a smaller footprint for the festival, with a concentration in the Hockley area. Even with a smaller format, the festival remains the biggest, multi-venue music festival in the city, recruiting over 20 venues to host a whole range of genres.

There was also a new focus on outside entertainment, facilitated by the street closure of Broad St and Carlton Street, allowing a huge array of performers and artists to strut their stuff including jugglers, belly dancers, fire breathers, a drumming troupe, football freestyler and free runners.

The event raised over £15,000 for local charities: The John Van Guest Cancer Research Centre, Framework, Nottingham & Nottinghamshire Refugee Forum, Nottingham CYF Project, Dolly Parton Imagination Library and Rethink Mental Health (Nottingham).

The festival is organised each year by a diverse team who come together to collaborate on the project with the support of the European Regional Development Fund, The Creative Quarter and One Nottingham, and support in kind from Nottingham businesses including Gigantic, LeftLion, Farmyard Events and Fast Graphics.

Smile Train—Children from Developing Countries Benefit from the Nottingham Awards

Guests at the Nottingham Awards event were invited to donate to Smile Train.

Smile Train is an international children's charity with a sustainable approach to a single, solvable problem: cleft lip and palate. Every year 170,000 children are born in developing countries with a cleft palate and they cannot afford the surgery to correct it. Millions of children in developing countries with unrepaired clefts live in shame, but more importantly, have difficulty eating, breathing and speaking. Cleft repair surgery is simple, and the transformation is immediate.

The Smile Train sustainable model provides training and funding to empower local doctors in 85+ developing countries to provide 100%-free cleft repair surgery in their communities.

The event raised £507, which was then matched by a donation from local charity, Haydn Green Foundation. The Haydn

Green Foundation has been supporting 'Smile Train's work since the charity was established in loving memory of a local businessman, Mr Haydn Green. This donation of £1014 means that 6 children were able to have surgery which gave them their first smiles.

Nottingham Playhouse Panto Teams up with the Dolly Parton Imagination Library

Panto-goers in Nottingham are being encouraged to help give the gift of reading to Nottingham children this Christmas.

Nottingham Playhouse has teamed up with the Dolly Parton Imagination Library to raise funds for free books for children. The book gifting scheme is one of the official panto charities for this year's performances of Dick Whittington.

Volunteers from across the city are collecting donations at performances of Dick Whittington at Nottingham Playhouse over the festive season, in an attempt to help raise funds for the scheme to give free books to children from birth until their fifth birthday.

Dolly's scheme is already running in some parts of the City. Originally sparked by volunteers in Wollaton, the scheme gained support from The Rotary Club of Nottingham, Castle Cavendish and Nottingham City Council. The scheme is being expanded further thanks to Small Steps Big Changes (SSBC) – a £45m programme of activities and initiatives headed up by Nottingham CityCare Partnership to help give Nottingham's 0-3 year olds a better start in life.

Nottingham children are likely to start school with reading skills up to 14% behind the national average. Dolly Parton's Imagination Library has been proven to tackle this problem effectively and support children to improve early reading skills.

Councillor David Mellen, the Portfolio Holder

for Early Intervention and Early Years, said: "We are delighted that the Playhouse has offered to support the Imagination Library.

"This amazing charity helps to inspire children to love books. We know reading changes lives. It broadens horizons and opens up a whole world of opportunities. However, funds are needed to expand the scheme and make sure every child in Nottingham can be a part of it.

"Our ambition is to extend the Imagination Library so that every Nottingham child from 0-5 years old can get a free book delivered to their home each month. Together we can ignite a life-long passion for reading and give our children the very best start in life."

Chief Executive at Nottingham Playhouse, Stephanie Sirr said, "We are delighted to be supporting Dolly Parton's Imagination Library with collections after performances of Dick Whittington at Nottingham Playhouse. The charity does fantastic work to improve literacy, raise aspirations and bring families together through reading, so we thought it was an ideal

opportunity to help them to raise some vital funds."

Research shows that early reading helps children to:

- Develop a love of books and reading
- Have dedicated one-to-one time with parents
- Discover new ideas and words
- Perform better at school in reading and writing.

Community Grants Available for Green Initiatives

Nottingham City Council is again awarding grants to community and voluntary organisations to encourage communities to live greener.

Grants of up to £2,500 are available and this year's scheme has a collaborative aim, with up to £1,000 available to spend on existing projects and the remainder to be used to help set up similar projects in other areas.

Grants will be awarded to one group per Nottingham City Council ward, and applications which support waste minimisation, energy efficiency, and climate change awareness will be welcomed.

Projects eligible for the grant could include:

- Community Events
- Campaigns to promote waste minimisation
- Community level recycling education
- Community-relevant energy efficiency awareness
- Projects to help communities out of fuel poverty
- Community flood awareness campaigns
- Creation of community influencers / news groups (via assistance from existing groups).

The project, activity or event must benefit Nottingham City residents and should be community driven involving local residents.

The grants scheme will:

- Make issues like climate change, sustainability, waste management, and energy use understandable and relevant to local people
- Engage with local people who may not have considered environmental issues, before as well as those who are already actively reducing their environmental impact
- Support existing projects which demonstrate new ways of engaging the local community to further reduce carbon emissions
- Kick start new projects and activities.

New Mobile App Benefits Nottingham Parents

Thanks to Small Steps, Big Changes, expectant mums and dads across Nottingham can now benefit from a new, personalised smart phone app designed to guide them through pregnancy and the first six months of parenthood.

The free Baby Buddy app will help all Nottingham parents expecting a baby – as well as those living in the SSBC wards of Aspley, Bulwell, St Ann's and Arboretum.

Baby Buddy works through parents creating an 'avatar'. The avatar acts as a personal friend to support parents on their emotional, physical and social journey through pregnancy and becoming a new parent.

The app has been produced by the child health charity Best Beginnings and endorsed by the Department of Health, the Royal College of Midwives and the Institute of Health Visiting amongst others.

SSBC has been working closely with Health and Early Years professionals to explore how the app can be used to support expectant and new parents.

Downloadable for free on Androids and iPhones, the app will be promoted in Children's Centres, as well as through Health and Early Years professionals across Nottingham.

Nottingham City Homes Tenth Anniversary Book



For the last decade Nottingham City Homes (NCH) has been responsible for managing council houses across the city.

As part of the events planned to mark its tenth anniversary, NCH has chosen to take a reflective look at council housing across the city by launching the first ever book of its kind covering the history of Nottingham's council houses called **Homes and Places**.

The book, which is now available to buy from [Five Leaves Bookshop](#), includes personal stories and memories from some of the city's residents as well as photographs and planning documentation dating back as far as the 1800s.

The book includes contributions from people such as Derek Buttress who was seven when he moved into a council house on Frinton Road with his parents and sister Brenda in the 1930s.

"Come look at this!" Brenda shouted from another room. I ran to her. Fixed to the wall by the window was a hand basin with two shining chrome taps. Brenda was wrestling with the cold tap, trying to turn it on but lacking strength.

'A sink in the bedroom!' she said awestruck. I knocked her hand out of the way and turned on the tap.

We watched the water swirl around the small basin, then gurgle noisily away. After the one-tap house we had lived in before, such a facility in a bedroom seemed a reckless extravagance."



Indices of Deprivation 2015

The Indices of Deprivation 2015 were published at the end of September.

The Indices of Deprivation measure relative levels of deprivation in 32,844 small areas or neighbourhoods, called Lower Super Output Areas (LSOA's), in England. Each area is given a score and a rank for seven distinct types ('domains') of deprivation which are then combined to calculate the overall Index of Multiple Deprivation.

University of Nottingham Contributes Millions to Local Economy

The University of Nottingham contributes £1.1bn a year to the UK economy and supports around 18,000 jobs across the country according to a new report.

Based on an independent assessment of economic impact by Oxford Economics; the report '**The Economic Impact of The University of Nottingham**' - outlines the wider economic, social and cultural impact the University has on the city of Nottingham, the region and the nation.

According to the report, the University is one of the East Midlands' most significant institutions, with **92 per cent** of its workforce living in the region, and **one in every 24 jobs** in Nottingham being reliant in some part on the University.

The total economic impact generated across the East Midlands each year by the University is **£781m**, and along with its **£500m** research portfolio, the University is at the heart of the [Midlands Engine for Growth](#).


Relaxed Pantomime Performances of Aladdin
